## Local couple seeks home to shelter Athens' homeless

For the last four years Keith Wasserman and his wife, Darlene, have opened the basement of their Elilot Street home to homeless people.

Individuals who were poor, had been evicted, were transients or recently released from the Athens Mental Health Center could seek shelter at the Wasserman's house, which they called "Good Works."

The city police, county sheriff's departments or other social agencies, such as the Salvation Army, would inform people about the house.

However, the chore of handling the 114 people who stayed more than 300 days at their home in 1983 has become a burden the Wassermans want to change. Now they are seeking a shelter for the homeless to be run by a house manager. The local

January 1st marked the start of our 39th year. From our small beginnings in the basement of my home in 1981 to our present day, we recognize that God has invited us into this ministry and trusted us with responsibility. We pledge to use our power for good as we continue to love and serve, and develop friendships with people who experience vulnerability, exclusion, and poverty.

Terri Woodson has been on the Good Works staff for 19 years and has held several different roles. Today, she is the key person who receives inquiries from people who are asking for help through Transformation Station, and orients them to our community. She has eves to not only see the needs of a person, but also the *potential* of what they could be like if their burdens were lifted. This month, Terri shares these thoughts with us:

When we invite people in to participate, no matter what area, we intentionally sit down with them and listen to their interests and ideas, as well as orient them to what we are doing and how we are doing it. Out of these times come connecting points. Sometimes the connecting points are their gifts and how they can use them. Another is their perspective on lifethat they know their viewpoint and their voice matters.

Many of the people we come into a relationship with have some type of a crisis they are dealing with or have dealt with. If they are coming to the Timothy House, through the Transformation Station, or are one of our neighbors whose home is in disrepair, initially they are expecting a service type of relationship. We

deliberately and intentionally seek out more, knowing that each person is made in the image of God, and wondering what can happen here. What can we offer or receive that is lasting? We know that repairs are necessary but temporary; however, we have found lasting relationships.

Time and time again we have had people stay at the Timothy House, come through the Transformation Station, or receive help through Neighbors Helping Neighbors, who decide that they want to come back and be a part of the community in some way. Many come on a regular basis to Friday Night Life where they can reconnect with people on a weekly basis, often times bringing desserts or helping hands to assist their neighbors. Older neighbors will come join us for lunch at the Hannah House after a team of volunteers has just finished working on their home. Whatever way they come, whether through the ways I just mentioned or other connecting points, we are hoping they feel like they have a loving community they can be an active part of.

These activities promote community building, companionship, creativity, and we can go on. They steer young people into healthy options for their lives. They let the elderly and disabled in our community know that they are relevant and cared about. They inspire people towards hope. Reminding them that they don't have to settle for loneliness and lack, that they are more than welcome to share their lives with us, and we would like to do the same.

Many of these people who have come over the years through these initiatives have come back to participate with us simply to be a part of the community. They may have initially needed shelter or some material item, but later wanted to share in the growing of relationships and building of hope. In any given initiative you will find them. They may be preparing take-home food bags at Friday Night Life, or going out to help us repair someone's home, or spending time with our residents at the Timothy House, and even fund raising for us for the Good Works Walk. And all the while the worth and dignity of each person is being affirmed and appreciated.

Terri is one of four current Good Works staff members who came initially as residents of the Timothy House. Following her stay there in 1996, she participated in Life in Transition, living in the Hannah House for over a year. She is married to Bill, and together they have one son, Benjamin, who is now 16 years old.
